A is air, so we checked our tyres.

B is for brakes, so we pulled the brake to see if they stopped the tyres from moving.

C is for the chain, to see if it was rusty or not and will ride smoothly.

D is for drop test, to see if the wheels were screwed on right.

Once all the checks were finished, we got on our bikes and rode around the playground a few times and then we practiced signals for turning. We practised a few more things like riding slowly and stopping quickly in case a person steps out in front of you.

After break time, we put on our Hi-Vis jackets and went on to the road by Smestow School. We practiced 'pass me' and 'follow me' positions on the road. Next, we learnt how to do U-turns and how to ride safely at a junction. We practiced signaling on the road and then rode back to school for lunch.

When we went back out on the road, we went over what we had learnt with a few other things like riding on the main road. We went by a church and rode our bikes for 20 minutes. Then, we had a break and then rode back to where we started by Smestow School, had a chat with the Bikeability trainers and then returned to school.

Back in the playground, we did some races and played for a few minutes. Once we had finished all our training, we sat in the Sensory Garden and were given our certificates for completing our level 2!
